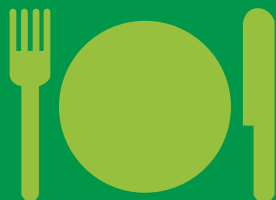

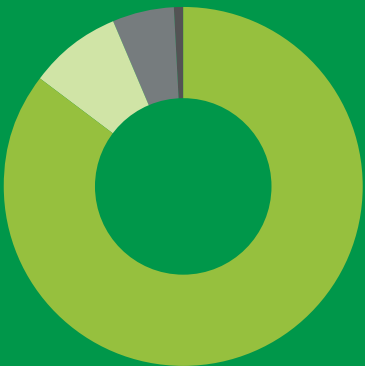

# Reports from our Chairperson and Chief Executive / Kaiarahi



# Kudos to Kaibosh staff and volunteers

It has been a year of consolidation for Kaibosh. After the trials of COVID-19, it has been great to get back to business as usual and focus on our core task of getting good food to those who need it, with far fewer of the distractions and disruptions of previous years. Kudos to the team of hard working staff and volunteers for another stellar year of food distribution.

That said, as the year drew to a close it came with a big change, as we said goodbye to our long standing GM/CE Matt Dagger and welcomed our new CE Susie Robertson. Matt had been at the helm of Kaibosh for over ten years and it is difficult to over state the contribution that he made to the organisation.

It is worth recapping some of Matt's achievements as they tell the story of Kaibosh over the last decade.

When Matt joined, there were two staff, one truck and just a handful of volunteers. Now we are an organisation with 26 staff and over 180 volunteers. Over the course of his time, Matt and the team have expanded and consolidated the reach of Kaibosh's operations – including evacuating our earthquake damaged Tennyson Street premises, creating the Petone pallet-handling distribution hub and setting up, then expanding, our Kāpiti base. He's raised over \$5.6 million for the organisation in funding, and oversaw the distribution of over 10 million meals to people in our local communities.

He's also driven the efficiencies in our operations down to an average level of just under \$2 per kilo.

Let's also not forget Matt's influence in spreading the impact of food rescue beyond Wellington. He's been a leading light in the sector, helping interested parties set up food rescue operations across Aotearoa, inspired by the experience (and IP) of Kaibosh. He was instrumental in setting up the Aotearoa Food Rescue Alliance (AFRA), an organisation which is giving voice and support to the whole food rescue sector.

As we all know, Matt is one amazing guy. We are so glad that his achievements have been recognised publicly, being recently named as a recipient of an Absolutely Positively Wellingtonian Award.

This all said, we are thrilled that Susie has joined us. Her positive, practical and people-focused nature has meant that she has hit the ground running, and is brilliantly capable of taking Kaibosh into its next chapter.
